
### **Deadly Science**

### **Gastroenteritis -**Controlling viral outbreaks in Childcare Centres and Schools



Viral gastroenteritis is highly infectious and outbreaks are very common and can be difficult to control. Outbreaks often occur in institutional settings such as nursing homes, hospitals, childcare centres and schools.

The following precautions should be taken to restrict the spread of gastroenteritis:

- Children and / or staff with vomiting or diarrhoea should be separated from the rest of the group as soon as symptoms appear. This may involving a room to the sick children (such as sickbay) before they can be sent home.
- Sick children and staff should be excluded from attending the facility for a least 48 hours after their symptoms have ceased.

## **Deputy Principal's Article**

### Supporting and Managing Student Behaviour

The NSW Department of Education's Inclusive, Engaging and Respectful (IER) schools package includes three new policies that help our school manage the diverse spectrum of student needs to improve outcomes for all students.

The new policies, framework and procedures aim to strengthen the engagement and participation of all students, including those with disability, complex and challenging behaviours and additional needs. They provide more support to teachers and also ensure all students, teachers and staff are safe in school.

On of the key updates that was introduced as part of the IER package was the Student Behaviour Policy and Procedures. This policy and its procedures provide stronger guidance for schools to support and manage behaviour in consideration of a student's individual needs while providing a safe environment for all students, teachers and staff.

To ensure Coffs Harbour Public School's processes align with the new policies we are going to undertake some changes to how we support and manage student behaviour in 2023.

All school staff have attended professional learning on the Berry St Education Model which provides strategies for teaching and learning that enables teachers to increase engagement of students with complex, unmet learning needs. We have also been examining best practice as outlined in the book *When the Adults Change Everything Changes* by Paul Dix.

Over the next 2 terms, the school is planning to use the new policies and what we have learned in professional learning to make changes to our current school-based behaviour policy and proceedures. During this time, we will be consulting with the community to ensure that the changes made meet your needs.

### Moving into year 7 in a NSW Government school in 2024

If you would like your child to attend a government high school in 2024, you will need to complete an expression of interest for Year 6 to 7 transition. The expression of interest lets you indicate which school(s) you would like your child to attend in Year 7. Most NSW Government schools have local enrolment areas with geographical boundaries. Your child's permanent residential address determines which high school's boundary they fall within. After you submit this expression of interest and it has been assessed, your child will be offered a place at a government high school.

Please note: The last day for submission is 31 March 2023

# 3/4MB: Mega Brains at CHPS!





Giinagay (hello), 2D have been learning the differences between an Acknowledgement of Country and a Welcome to Country, and why they are important.


Our class have been exposed to the story Welcome to Country written by Joy Murphy Wandin during our English lessons. Aunty Joy welcomes us to Country with a Wurundjeri Wominjeka (welcome) which explains the concept of welcoming ceremonies and their significance to First Nation communities across Australia.



An Acknowledgement of Country is like if you're a guest at a birthday; you are acknowledged when you arrive and would say 'thank you for having me' when you leave. It is important for our children to understand where they learn and play, on Gumbaynggirr land.

Our class are learning that the Gumbaynggirr elders are also the keepers of Indigenous knowledge, such as law, kinship, and language in our area. Therefore, it is important to acknowledge their strength and for the contributions they still make within our community.

2D have opted to recite a class Acknowledgement of Country daily, thereby instilling an awareness of the uniqueness of Aboriginal culture and the special place it has within Australia. Not only are they learning to recite an acknowledgement to country, but they are also learning to use Sign Language (AUSLAN) to pay respects to the many Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who are Deaf.


